'Staff demonstrate commitment, passion, and professional capability to provide quality education for taiohi'

The preliminary report is very positive and will also include some Key Next Steps for our organisation which is in the process of ratification. Once we receive our confirmed report this will be circulated to all whānau

Kia ora koutou,

Term 2 has proven to be a big Term with Kapa Haka, ERO, Te Moana, Winter Sports, PBLs, Innovation Time and NACA, being some of the big kaupapa.

We are happy with the progressions that we are making with our Hotaka (our Teaching and Learning Framework). Our Juniors have had enriching experiences organised for them by our Kaitiaki and our Senior's are being navigated through their NCEA programmes.

We very much appreciate your support in helping us to improve our Attendance processes so far this Term. We believe that overall 'productivity' is still very much a work in progress and we will be meeting in holidays to work through some better solutions for this.

We still seem to be facing an uphill battle with clothes and shoes being left around the whare. We are very grateful to our whānau who have volunteered their time so far to collect and wash gear. However, each time this is done the mahi is huge. If you have any solutions around this, we would love to hear about them.

We are looking forward to the opportunity to have some time to rest and reflect over the coming holidays. In Week 2, Term 3, we will be holding a Whānau evening of workshops around NCEA, ITLPs, Term Planners and PBLs, this same evening will also be an opportunity to collect and meet with Kaitiaki (Rōpū and Learning Area) about the Mid - Year Report. We hope to see all of you at this evening.

Year 12 & 13 Leadership Noho

On Wednesday July 5, our Manu Tai Prefects have planned a Leadership Noho for all Yr 12 and 13 Taiohi. The focus of this Noho will be on extending taiohi leadership capacity. Panui for this went out on Friday 23 June, if you require a Panui still, contact the office. The cost of this Noho is \$10 and this is being asked to be paid in cash to the office, so that kai can be purchased for everyone on Wednesday evening. This evening begins at 4.30pm and goes through until the following morning during conditioning. After conditioning, Thursday's programme will continue on as per normal. If you have any questions about this Noho, please contact Whaea Mere, she will be the Kaitiaki who will be leading this Noho, there will be other Kaitiaki assisting the entire time, as well. The expectation is that all Yr 12 and Yr 13 taiohi make an effort to attend this Noho. If there are sports trainings or games on, they can attend directly after these are finished. We have invited TW Taiohi Graduates a long for a portion of this Noho, between 6.30pm and 8pm, our Graduates will be running workshops for our taiohi. We believe that this kaupapa will be important for progressing our vision of Kia Tū, Kai Ora, Kia Māori.

Lateness

Lateness is justified (coded as "J") only if the parent/caregiver notifies the kura that the taiohi is late due to taiohi attending tangihanga, serious illness of a close relative, attending an unveiling, attending doctors or dentist appointments or involvement in Court Proceedings. This may also include unplanned justified lateness such as the breakdown of the bus, accidents, road closure, extreme weather conditions etc.

Unjustified lateness (coded as "L" on our system) is lateness of taiohi due to sleeping in, missing the bus or ride, catching a late arriving bus, attending a birthday or shopping expedition etc, tiredness from conditioning/sports tournaments, catching up with visiting family, or looking after younger siblings.

If taiohi are marked late, three times in one term, they will be expected to attend an afterschool consequence.

Kura to Career (K2C)

Our kura has been approached by Waikato-Tainui Raupatu Lands Trust and Tertiary Education Commission (TEC) to partner in a kaupapa called Kura to Career (K2C).

K2C aims to raise achievement rates of Māori school leavers from Level 2 to at least a Level 4 qualification within 3 years of leaving school.

In Term 3, Year 10-Year 13 taiohi will commence in a mentoring programme that supports their educational and career aspirations and goals. The mentoring programme involves monthly meetings with a mentor and also participating in workshops that enhance their study and/or life skills.

The K2C project will be externally reviewed. This will involve interviews and/or surveys with taiohi, kaitiaki and possibly whānau members. The purpose of the external review is to evaluate the effectiveness of the project and if successful, TEC will look at ways to roll-out the K2C model across other kura.

Mentoring will be held within the normal school hours. All mentors will be trained and have gone through Police vetting.

We are excited about the K2C project as we see real benefits for our taiohi receiving support to reach their goals.





FUTURE PATHWAYS

Nāku te rourou, nāu te rourou, ka ora ai te iwi! With your food basket and my food basket everybody will flourish!

E ngā mātua nei ra ka mihi,

Over the past few weeks as I sit in morning karakia every morning listening to our taiohi share their career aspirations I have heard a number of them change direction over time. Personally, I see this as a very positive thing! We should expect our taiohi to change career aspirations during their time here at Tai Wānanga this just means they are getting closer to thing we call 'My Career Aspiration' which then leads to more clarity around their Exit Strategy. The changes mentioned can come from a number of places, for instance: Gateway/STAR Courses, Shadow days, Internships and Work Experience. For our Yr13 cohort the focus has been centered around them finding work placement for Term 2 and 3. We still have around 50% of this cohort not taking up this opportunity to be mentored. One day of the week has been dedicated for this purpose (Thursdays). So Please whānau if you have any contacts /networks in the following Industries:

- Building and Construction, trades etc
- Health doctors, nursing, chiropractic, physio etc

First Aid and Workplace Health & Safety Certificates

I would like to congratulate a number of our taiohi who successfully completed these courses in Term 1 and 2. This makes a great addition to a C.V.



Driver's Licensing

Learners License - We now have Road Codes available to all taiohi located in the Careers Corner. Also a programme has come available in the holidays check out our FB page for more details.

Restricted and Full license - The benefits of having a license is a huge advantage to our taiohi. We are happy support our taiohi financially by contributing to the education programmes such as Defensive Driving Courses and Driving lessons (conditions apply). Music Programme

We recognise here at Tai Wānanga that we have an abundance of naturally talented musicians. Complementing these natural skills with the theory component transforms this passion and interest into a feasible Future Pathway. The theory component is a prerequisite for any tertiary provider or professional musician. Currently tutorials are taking place every Thursday morning for 1 hour where our junior cohort alternate between keyboard and ukulele lessons with the aim of working towards the production 'Māui Te Tupua' and prize giving at the end of year. In the very near future we also look forward to growing this programme to include our senior taiohi introducing them to new instruments such as Brass instruments in Term 3. Watch this space!

PROJECT BASED LEARNING

"Advancing Māori success as Māori through Project Based Learning"

Term 1 Junior PBL

The debut of 'Te Moana' our Junior PBL short film was an absolute success. Taiohi endeavoured to experience first hand the making of a short film from planning, production and final presentation. Whaea Hinewirangi Kohu Morgan was a wonderful ambassador, fronting our film with professionalism and grace. Thank you to the many individuals who made this project a success.

Term 2 Junior PBL Update

Our taiohi are in full swing with our Term 2/3, Junior PBL. The kaupapa for this Kaitiaki-led project is centred around a theatre production called 'Māui - Te Tupua'. Taiohi are facilitated by kaitiaki and external experts in various areas and contribute to the final product which is the theatre production. Every Wednesday and Thursday morning taiohi are involved in one of the following areas:

- Acting
- Kapa haka / dance ensemble
- Music Ukulele and keyboard lessons; band; sound scaping
- Prop making and set design; Technical stage lighting & sound
- Marketing

The taiohi have made really good progress to date and they are enthusiastic about the project. We are grateful for the support from the Future pathways gateway programme to support itinerant music lessons to take place for our junior taiohi (see Future Pathways section for more information). Also, Maioha Panapa, a past taiohi and current Waikato University student, has been lending a helping hand with the actors and actresses. We have also had Whaea Tuihana Ohia-Papa teach the kapa haka / dance ensemble some zumba dance moves. All in all, the external support is very welcomed and is adding great value to the learning experiences of our taiohi. Leading up to the show in Term 3 (show dates to be confirmed), we will need some support with the sewing of costumes. Round 2 Senior PBL

We are now into round 2 of senior PBL which has been developed and improved based on a taiohi led feedback forum. Much of the feedback centred around the importance of the following:
